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



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


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DISTRICT EVENTS MAZHALAI OLI

Literacy level II training of CLCCs and club Presidents was held on June 2nd at Alumni Club. The sessions were handled by ZLC Prabha Raghunandan and me. It was well attended by CLCCs, club Presidents and Area Literacy co-ordinators.

A meeting was held with Area Literacy Coordinators, PDC Bhamini Parthasarathy, PDC Sita

Lakshminarayana, PDC Kalaravichandran, CLCCs and Presidents on 4th September to discuss the areas of focus in the TEACH vertical and also the role and responsibilities of CLCCs and Presidents.

The most vital element of teacher support aims to improve the professional skills of the teachers, which will have a positive impact on the learning outcomes of the students. It was decided to organize two day workshop for teacher training spread over two Saturdays 6th and 20th October. Clubs were requested to identify teachers from govt/govt aided primary and secondary schools, for enrolling in the workshop.

Teacher Training workshop began on 6th October, 86 teachers participated in the workshop. Mr. Venkat, Deputy Director of Max Academy, a psychologist deeply involved in the scientific study of learning skills, lead the first half day session. The subjects covered were, Class Room Management; Diversified Teacher Training Techniques and Memory Techniques.

This was followed by a session on teaching science through story telling by Lavanya Srinivas of IWC Chennai Thiruvanmiyur an accomplished story teller, trainer who has conducted many workshops on storytelling for both children and adults.

Both sessions were very interesting, interactive and well received by the participants.

The second and final day of the workshop is scheduled for 20th October 2018 with five sessions. The subjects to be covered are:-



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

A TRIP TO HEAVENLY BALI



IS it unusual for an Indian woman to travel alone? Maybe, but times have changed. A good dose of "me time" is the need of the hour. For a single woman traveler, Bali is a safe and wonderful travel option.



An 11 hour Malindo flight took me to the artistic Ngurah International Airport, Denspar. I was met by my taxi driver Mano, Foreign exchange shops are aplenty so getting your currency converted is never a problem. New 100 dollar notes however fetch the best rates.

DAY 2:

My first day at Bali was at the Widya Batik Studio. The owner and head teacher Widya, picked me up for the class. My mentor for the day was Katu (a name given to all 4th children) who taught me to hold the chanting-the Balinese wax pen for batik drawing. Being the water loving Piscean, I decided to go with a koi lotus theme. Beginning with tracing or sketching the design onto the 1 meter by 0.5 meter cotton canvas, Katu patiently helped us through several goof ups before the sketch was neat and the wax went through the cloth. We used wax stamps to create the typical Balinese borders. All pigments were sourced from islands across Indonesia with Indigo (most expensive) alone coming in from India. Once all parts of the batik were coloured, they were mounted on wooden frames to dry.

An acid bath to bring out the hues was followed with a cold water bath and a dunking in a vat of boiling water to remove the acid solution and wax. The batik was finally plunged into cold water to hold the colours and mounted on wooden frames to dry. Magic – the colours popped out from our batiks!

DAY 3:

I woke up to a mild earth quake, "normal in Bali" according to the waitress who served breakfast. I decided to walk to the silver jewellery workshop through roads and streets that are named after various characters from the Ramayan or the Mahabharath.

At the Chez Monique studios run by Wayan, I chose to create a ring with a fish design. This meant using silver wires instead of silver plates. After much twisting, turning, cutting and filing down edges, the silversmiths fused pieces of my ring together and allowed me a hand in the soldering process. The black soot from soldering was removed with a toothbrush and soap. A lick of polish and tada my shining sparkling ring was ready to wear!

Done with the workshop, my driver and guide Adi picked me up for a half day tour of South Bali. Lunch was followed by a trip to the picturesque temple of Bedegul and Pura Tanah Lot, a temple by the seaside with a cave carved out by the force of the waves.

We then headed to La Laguna, a picturesque Gypsy village. At the restaurant I decided to sit on a little bridge to get an uninterrupted view of the sunset. The minimum spending expected here is 1,50,000 IDR. Horrendous, but worth it as I have never actually seen the sun slowly disappear off the horizon!

DAY 4:

My teacher Dewi from Ubud Botany Interactive walked me to her quaint little organic beauty store on Kajeng Street. I noticed peoples' names etched onto concrete slabs on the road. Dewi explained that tourists could have a memory of their trip to Bali by donating cement paving stones to build the street. It started in 1973 and was completed in 2012. The downhill cycling tour began with breakfast at Aroma a restaurant with an awesome breakfast spread and a fantastic view of Mt. Batur, a dormant volcano alongside the adjoining Batur Lake. At the cycle park we were given safety instructions and donned safety gear before proceeding single file through the villages of Kintamani. We cycled through

The welcome drink was the traditional but expensive 'Jamu' or the equally good herbal green tea.

We learnt 4 products - a soap free shampoo, a turmeric and rice face pack, a sun screen lotion and Balinese tiger balm. The shampoo really didn't help my dandruff but softened my color treated hair. The face pack is quite good but needs refrigeration. Once done with the workshop, I splurged on knick knacks at the Ubud Market.

DAY 5:

I got ready to visit temples on the holy day of Kuningan. Famous for its trimurthy of Vishnu, Brahma and Shiva the Goa Ghaja cave has a picturesque



temple tank. Climbing down to the cave is easy but the climb up can leave you breathless.

Gunung Kawi, lies another 300 steps down with pretty rice fields, souvenir shops and restaurants on either side. Divided into by a beautiful stream with a picturesque bridge to cross over, the other side has a pretty Koi pond, fed by the mountain springs. Again, the climb back up was a challenge.

The Tirtt Empol is a temple with holy springs. A fun and cherished activity for kids here is feeding the gigantic Koi, special fish food.

At the Bali Pulinas Plantation, one of the many plantations boasting Agro tourism you get to see the Luwak, a civet cat indigenous to the island of Bali. This eats the choicest coffee berries and poops out the seeds. The seeds in turn are cleaned, washed, boiled, dried, roasted to perfection and ground by hand. The highlight of this tour is the free tasting of the varieties of teas, coffees and cocoa along with a delicious side of tapioca chips. However the Luwak coffee is chargeable. I politely declined the tasting of the potty coffee (as the Balinese lovingly call it).

We then proceeded onto Tegelalang rice fields. These rice fields are built on steps and one can climb down and up again to get a view from the opposite side of the valley.

DAY 6:

At the cycle park we were given safety instructions and donned safety gear before proceeding single file through the villages of Kintamani. We cycled through rice fields to a Balinese house for a glimpse of the rustic life. Lunch was at the restaurant run by Bali ecocyclists.

DAY 7:

After check out, Adi took me to catch the spectacular sunset at Uluwatu temple, home to some boisterous monkeys! On Adi's suggestion I shopped at Krshna, a store near the airport offering expensive but amazing Balinese souvenirs.

Bali is certainly a wonderful and safe place to travel for a single woman. Will I go back to Bali? A definite yes!

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
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

THE MOTHER TONGUE **CONUNDRUM**

he language of my ancestors is Malayalam, the language my mother was most comfortable speaking, the accent of which she infused into any other language she learnt or spoke. As a recent WhatsApp forward I received said, she was "a Malayali - one who could speak Malayalam in all languages". So, if you go by the dictionary meaning of the phrase, my own mother tongue should also be Malayalam - I'm pretty sure that's the first language I would have heard or spoken. My successful public sector official father was extremely fluent in English and Malayalam - the only two languages he knew well, apart from a smattering of Hindi arising out of longish work stints in Bombay (as it was called then) and Jamshedpur before he moved to Bangalore. He never picked up any other language much and even after forty years in Bangalore, if he tried to speak in Kannada, we - his children, ran for cover. The locals being the peace loving kind, chose not to clobber him for gross murder of their language. Any case, it took them a while to understand that he was actually speaking in their native tongue.

When I started school, I learnt English. And since I grew up in Bangalore, somewhere along the way, I learnt to speak Kannada fluently. Not to read and write, that came much later, after a high school stint of five years in a little town about 80 km from cosmopolitan Bangalore. A town so close to Bangalore but with none of its British Cantonment style, and so locally local as to make anybody from Bangalore appear "foreign". A Malayali from Bangalore who couldn't read or write Kannada - need you even ask?

But I digress. Let's get back to Bangalore. The three language formula of the southern states ensured that I learnt Hindi too in school. But Bangalore being what it was in the 1970's, and Bangalore schools being what they were then, it was English that was the mode of communication between classmates, friends and neighbours.

I don't really know when it was that English became my mother tongue. In a discussion on the subject a long time ago (so long ago, that it could qualify as once upon a time!) my father mentioned

that the language one is most comfortable with, is the language you use to count. That for me, as far as I can remember, has always been English. A Tenali Rama story that I now only vaguely recall, had the witty court jester find out the mother tongue of a person who set the king a challenge to discover it. Tenali Rama is said to have found it out by making the man stub his feet when he thought he was alone. The phrase he used to express his pain and annoyance would supposedly be only in his mother tongue. By that logic too, let me assure you that the only swear words or irritation that would emanate from my mouth would all be in English, the less colourful ones vocally, the more evocative ones silently in my mind.

As a kid, I read extensively in English, anything I could lay my hands on - books, magazines, comics, even the newspapers that wrapped things we bought. My parents encouraged this, probably it kept me out of mischief. They themselves read extensively in Malayalam, my busy-at-Finance-Dad not so much, my mother more so. My mother periodically made attempts to ensure that I could read fluently in Malayalam too. I think she harboured notions of me reading classic Malayalam novels. Some I did. The English translations! But it is due to her efforts that I am literate in Malayalam. I can read the newspapers and magazines, takes a little time, though. Mostly because the words I read make me do a double take many times, only to realise that I had initially read them hilariously wrong. At a pinch, I can write it too, but the old writing alphabet that I learnt from Mom, and the new print-easy alphabet that the language changed to, sometimes get mixed up in my head, leaving my writing neither here nor there. But in this day of computers that hardly matters.

My parents always spoke with us, their three children, in Malayalam. But between my brother, sister and I, we always spoke English. We could express ourselves better in that language, we joked in English, we fought in English and more importantly, we thought in English. Did English become my mother tongue then?

My sons grew up entirely in Kerala, they are fluent in the colloquial Malayalam, more so than I. But they

learnt English well, probably in good part due to the fact, that if I had to take them to task for anything, after the first few words in Malayalam (and many times not even that), the rest of the tirade would be entirely in English. Was it because English was already my mother tongue then?

I moved to Kerala after thirty good years in Karnataka, twenty five of them in Bangalore - the city that in my mind, is home. I've spent enough years in Cochin for it to be equally called home. I'm far more fluent in spoken Malayalam now, a language that comes so much more easily to tongue than when I was in Bangalore. I'm equally at home with Kannada. I can speak Hindi, without much trace of a South Indian accent, but I search for the vocabulary at times. I can manage a fair bit of Tamil, and I understand Telugu in bits and parts. But the language closest to my heart? Always English.

That got me thinking. I'm not really considered a native speaker of the language. If I were to speak in England for example, the Queen would certainly not be impressed with my English, even if she managed to keep a stiff upper lip. That was brought home to me a few years ago. No, I did not meet the Queen. She was saved the ignominy of that ordeal. It was a doc from the NHS who I met in India. In my conversation with her, I happened to make a statement on some confusion I was having, and said I didn't know whether I was coming or going. She looked mightily impressed and said, "That's very good English!" Having always prided myself on my turn of phrase in the language, I wasn't too sure whether I should be pleased or offended at her statement.

The Americans would laugh me out of their country if I claimed to be speaking excellent English. My pronunciation and spelling would all be suspect. Don't blame me, it was the British that colonised us, not the Americans. Well, the British colonised the Americas too, but Brexit from America happened earlier than in India, and they've had a longer time to turn English into a different language altogether. As Prof Higgins would say of the English language, "Why, in America, they haven't spoken it for years!"

Where does this all leave me? Surely, with an unsolvable conundrum - what on earth is my mother tongue, actually?

The sands of time They slip away From my eager grasp; Feeble attempt to stay the rush, My memories I clasp.


But they hurtle down In spite of me, The race is on To infinity; The light that shines In you and me Fulfils itself, Its destiny.

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THE ADULTERY JUDGEMENT – AN ANALYSIS

s much public outcry has been made against the Supreme Court's Judgement dated 27th September, 2018 holding that Section 497 of Indian Penal Code (IPC) and Section 198 of Criminal Procedure Code (Cr.PC) is unconstitutional, it is pertinent to discuss the rationale of the judgement in order to eliminate seemingly negative impact on the institution of marriage.

The intention of Section 497 is not to preserve the sanctity of the marriage but to protect the proprietary right of the husband over his wife, as can be revealed by the facts hereunder.

For easy understanding, the story line of a popular Hollywood movie 'Unfaithful', starring Richard Gere, Diane Lane and Oliver Martinez is taken as an example.

- Richard's wife Diane is in a relationship with Oliver.
- Only Richard (Husband) can prosecute Oliver (Third Party) for the act of adultery.
- Oliver (Third Party) is punishable with imprisonment for a term of up to 5 years or with fine or with both, but Diane (Wife) is not punishable as an abettor since she is assumed to be a victim, in the hands of a seducer.
- Diane (Wife) has no right to prosecute Richard (Husband) should he commit adultery. It is only the other woman's husband, as per Section 198 of Cr.PC who can prosecute Richard (Husband), as it is the other woman's husband's exclusive proprietary right over his wife's body that has been breached.
- Section 497 applies only to a woman who is 'a wife of another man'. Therefore if Richard (Husband) had sexual relations with an unmarried or divorced or widowed woman, it is outside the purview of adultery.
- There is no question of adultery if Richard (Husband) gives consent to the relationship between Diane (Wife) and Oliver (Third Party).

JUDGEMENT AND THE SANCTITY OF MARRIAGE:

The sanctity of marriage is not affected by the Judgement since, even before the Judgement, neither the wife could prosecute the husband nor the husband



could prosecute his wife, as she is deemed to be a victim under criminal law. It is always the third party who is punished since he interfered with the husband's exclusive entitlement, similar to that of theft.

Why is punishing the third party done away with, now? Assume a case where wife and husband are in judicial separation and the divorce petition is pending before the Court.

Hypothetically, if the wife finds another suitable partner and is in a relationship, technically under criminal law the husband can prosecute that man for adultery, curtailing the right of the wife to selfdetermine her partner. Whereas in a similar situation, the wife has no such right if the husband is in a relationship with any other woman and hence it is arbitrary.

It is after careful consideration of many aspects of sexual autonomy, gender equality, dignity and privacy, that Section 497 of Indian Penal Code and Section198 of Criminal Procedure Code, criminalising adultery has been held unconstitutional as it is biased and unjust.

MAKING CHILDREN SAFER ONLINE

hildren between the ages of 5 and 16 typically spend more than six hours a day in front of a screen. That rises to around eight hours for teenage boys, according to a 2015 report from the UK-based market-research agency Childwise. This may impair their ability to recognize emotions and could expose them to cyberbullying and sexual exploitation.

Instead of minimizing children's exposure to the dangers they may face online, one initiative is trying to build up their digital resilience, teaching children how to deal with those challenges. 'Digital intelligence quotient' (DQ) helps to provide 8- to 12-year-olds with the skills they need to thrive in the digital economy. Some schools already teach children to use digital technology by integrating computers and tablets into the classroom and teaching them how to code. They should also teach them how to use it safely, say DQ's supporters.

In 2015, Yuhyun Park, who devised the concept of the DQ, founded the DQ Institute, a think tank that aims to prepare children to be safe online. It is often assumed that technology has closed the digital divide and addressed social inequality, but Park's research suggests otherwise. A report released by the DQ Institute in 2018 studied nearly 38,000 children aged 8–12 in 29 countries and found that more than half are exposed to cyber risks such as cyberbullying, video-game addiction, sexual grooming and sexual behaviour. Children in developing countries are 1.3 times more likely to be exposed to cyber risks online than those in more tech-savvy nations.

In 2017, the DQ Institute launched a plan to roll out DQ programmes to more than 100 countries by 2020 with schools and education ministries in countries experiencing rapid digital transformations as the target audience. The DQ project has joined forces with some big names, including Google, Twitter and the UNICEF, and has received government funding from Singapore and Mexico. The goal, says Park, is to help governments understand the level of digital citizenship among students and teachers, and to help them develop their own DQ curriculum within three years.

ONLINE SAFETY

A child's DQ score is calculated on the basis of criteria that are considered essential to a safe and healthy digital life. The test uses a game-like atmosphere to evaluate how well children understand the importance of their digital identity, privacy management, their online footprint, critical thinking, digital empathy, cybersecurity, cyberbullying management and screentime management. Much of the information online is unfiltered and uncensored, so DQ programmes aim to provide children with an internal filter, says Park. They teach children how to evaluate online information, avoid dodgy websites, check multiple sources and identify trustworthy sites.

UNTHINKINGLY THOUGHTLESS!

re we by nature thoughtless and insensitive; is it something we cultivate over a period of time or are we totally unaware of how our actions affect others? I pray it is the last, for then there is still hope for our country!

Examples are a plenty. Of course, the most obvious one is the garbage situation. We dust and clean every corner of our homes but don't think twice about throwing garbage bags over the walls onto the streets.



परंतु एकाएक 1974 में कुछ ऐसा हुआ की मेरी साधारण सी ज़िन्दगी में उथल पुथल मच गई। मैं कक्षा 7 मे थी जब मेरे पिताजी का लखनऊ स्थानांतरण हो गया। लखनऊ भी भला कोई शहर था दिल्ली के सामने ? रोते पीटते मन मार कर मैंने लखनऊ के एक विद्यालय में प्रवेश लिया और पढ़ाई शुरू कर दी। प्रथम वर्ष तो बहुत कष्टदायक था परंतु धीरे धीरे मन लगने लगा। लखनऊ के लोग बहुत शांत स्वभाव के थे और विद्यालय का वातावरण भी बहुत प्रेरणादायक था।

कष्ट था तो केवल एक - मेरी हिंदी अध्यापिका की मेरे प्रति नाराज़गी ! हिंदी अध्यापिका श्रीमती शुक्ला का मानना था कि मुझे हिंदी नहीं आती थी । वे मुझे ' दिल्ली वाली लड़की ' कहके सम्बोधित करती थी और प्रायः मेरी पुस्तिका में लिखित हर उर्दू, अंग्रेज़ी, पंजाबी, हरयाणवी, सिंधी और राजस्थानी शब्द को लाल रंग से सुसज्जित कर देती थी - इतना लाल जैसे गुलाब का पुष्प ! उन्हें चाहिए थी संस्कृत शब्दावली से भरपूर शुद्ध हिंदी जो मैंने केवल दूरदर्शन के समाचारों में ही सुनी थी । यदि अपने नए विद्यालय में अपने लिए ध्वज स्तंभित करना था तो कुछ करना अतिआवश्यक हो गया !! मरती क्या न करती ! प्रतिदिन सम्पूर्ण एकाग्रता से दूरदर्शन समाचार देखती, हिंदी समाचार पत्र और सहयतयिक पत्रिकाएं पढ़ती, शब्दकोश देख देख कर अपना गृहकार्य करती । जितना समय हिंदी की पढ़ाई में व्यतीत किया उतना यदि शेष विषयों पर करती तो कक्षा में हर बार प्रथम आती ।

जैसै तैसे किसी प्रकार कक्षा 9 में पहूँच गयी और आशा की एक किरण प्रकट हुई । मेरी ही कक्षा में दिल्ली से एक छात्रा ने प्रवेश लिया। क्योंकि वह दूसरे प्रदेश से आई थी, उसको ' सरल हिंदी ' विषय स्वरूप दिया गया ! मेरी तो बांछे खिल गयीं । में भी तो दिल्ली यानी दूसरे प्रदेश की थी - मुझे भी ' सरल हिंदी ' मिलनी चाहिए ! पिताजी से पत्र लिखवाया और पहूचीं प्राध्यापक के पास ! भूल गयी कि दो साल से ' ' सहयतयिक हिंदी ' पढ़ रही थी -' सरल हिंदी ' का तो प्रश्न ही नहीं उठता !

कड़ी मेहनत करके यू पी बोर्ड की कक्षा 10 की परीक्षा में हिंदी में 63 अंक प्राप्त किये ! हिंदी की अध्यापिका श्रीमती शुक्ला ने आशीर्वाद देते हुए कहा - ' दिल्ली की लड़की आज लखनऊ की हो ही गयी ' ! मेरा तो जीवन ही सार्थक हो गया ! बाकी विषयों में मिले 70 प्रतिशत का तो कोई महत्व ही नहीं था - हिंदी सर्वोपरि थी !






